

Health



Gerald L. Ignace Indian Health Center

The mission of the Gerald L. Ignace Indian Health Center (GLIIHC) is to “improve the health, peace and welfare of Milwaukee’s Urban Indian Community.” Since its inception in 1999, GLIIHC remains the only multi-tribal American Indian agency in Milwaukee County that addresses the health and social needs of Milwaukee’s American Indian community. GLIIHC continues to look for avenues to improve the health, peace and welfare of Milwaukee’s Urban Indian Community. As the only multi-tribal American Indian agency in the area, GLIIHC is a community hub for many culturally appropriate and health-promoting activities. GLIIHC endeavors to continue current programming and seek ways to expand upon practices that have a successful track record.

Milwaukee Immediate Care Corporation

For 24 years, Milwaukee Immediate Care Corporation (MICC) has been the only full-time urgent care clinic and one of a handful of primary care practices remaining on Milwaukee’s near north side. Funding support helps the clinic meet its operating costs as it positions during the next year to continue providing medical services and proceed toward the development of an adjacent, prototype inner city pediatric/adolescent primary/urgent care clinic and senior day health center. The majority of patients are poor and the working poor. Most are on Medicaid and Badger Care. As well, some treated are also middle and lower-middle families. Such patients increasingly face challenges of being underinsured (with rising deductibles making access to healthcare problematic) and others uninsured. (Regarding the latter, important provisions in federal health reform will not become effective for at least three years — and still will leave many millions of Americans uninsured.)

Native American

Ain Dah Ing, Inc.

The Mission of Ain Dah Ing, Inc. (ADI), is to provide post treatment and residential care for chemically dependent Native American individuals 18 years and over. ADI uses standard methods of care for Native Americans in recovery from alcoholism and drug abuse, such as: individual case history, one-on-one counseling, alcohol and drug education, individual treatment planning, group therapy/lecture, self-help meetings, aftercare planning and referral resource network utilization.

American Indian Chamber of Commerce

the American Indian Chamber of Commerce of Wisconsin's (AICCW) mission is to promote members and affiliates, with an emphasis on American Indian owned businesses, joint ventures and professional associations. The AICCW's specific correlation with the Forest County Potawatomi mission is their focus upon addressing the struggles of American Indian business people throughout the state (both on and off reservations). AICCW work with those who are working to realize their vision of participating in the free enterprise system by providing access to capital, business education resources and economic diversification opportunities resulting in stronger Indian Country communities. Their contributions and impacts are measured in terms of business management technical assistance/education (i.e., capacity building), number of businesses startups and/or expansions, job creation, loans closed, access to securing government contracts and wealth creation over time.



King Advisory

The Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Back-to-School Festival is an annual event founded in 1995 by 10th District Milwaukee County Supervisor Elizabeth Coggs-Jones. Over the past 15 years, 45,000 book bags filled with school supplies have been distributed to Milwaukee's children. In 2009, over 25,000 people of all ages, with the majority from low-income backgrounds, attended the Festival. A 2009 survey sample revealed the bulk of children receiving book bags reside in the 53205, 53206, 53208 and 53212 zip codes, areas between 50 and 57 percent of children live below poverty.

Youth Development Boot Camp, Inc.

The Youth Development Boot Camp (YDB) was formally established in 2002, and offers a highly structured, military-based program through which underprivileged and troubled teen boys and girls are taught the benefits of facing and overcoming life's challenges through discipline, determined effort, self-confidence, respect for self and others and civic engagement. Specifically, youth come to YDB's 13-week program through referrals by judges of Milwaukee County, through the initiative of parents due to brushes with the legal system and other self and community-destructive behavior patterns. The program involves a highly regimented schedule of discipline, physical training, community service work, and drill and ceremony activities characteristic of military basic training. The values of honor, courage, and commitment strive to be instilled in participants as these are tools needed to succeed in society as responsible citizens and productive adults. These values are also modeled by their staff at all times. The program provides homework assistance and educational remediation and vocational opportunities for youth and their parents to participate in presentations and lectures by guest speakers including those from law enforcement, social service organizations, and the business community with regard to youth development are provided.

Arts & Culture

Marcus Center for the Performing Arts

The vision of the Marcus Center for the Performing Arts provides the setting for outstanding cultural experience, where the arts come to life for current and future generations. As part of carrying out the mission and vision at the Center, they are committed to providing community events that are available to all audiences like the Annual Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Birthday Celebration, A tribute to Education (over 14 area school groups are regular participants of this culturally enriching program), and KidZ Days In the City, which is an interactive arts program that is offered free-of-charge with a focus on integrating health and the arts.

Milwaukee Public Theatre

Milwaukee Public Theatre Ltd. (MPT) is a professional not-for-profit touring company founded in 1974 that increases awareness of current social issues, promotes cultural diversity and provides healing arts resources. The company reaches out to people of all cultures, ages and abilities, and reaches an average of 100,000 people yearly with 800 to 1,200 events, including arts workshops, original theatre works, community celebrations and large-scale parades and pageants. MPT has been working with Native American artists and organizations for over 20 years, including Spotted Eagle High School and the Gerald L. Ignace Indian Health Center (GLIIHC).

Civic & Community



New Threads

Formally known as CorpCare Distributions, New Threads operates a gift-in-kind program that provides brand-new apparel, footwear, bed and bath and household items to non-profit agencies serving the needs of the poor, the ill, children and seniors, so that they may live more self-sufficient and independent lives.

New Threads link manufacturers and retailers and their surplus products, samples, returns and past season lines with nonprofit social service agencies, schools and faith-based communities. They provide the warehousing, sorting, processing, and distribution services that make all these products usable and available to those who need them.



House of Peace

The House of Peace (HOP) was established in 1968. HOP is a ministry of the Province of St. Joseph of the Capuchin Order, Inc., and was created to provide the poor with the basic essentials and guidance to improve the quality of life. In the first year, the center provided food to 120 families throughout the year, and toys to 160 families. In 2009-2010, HOP provided services approximately 64,000 times to individuals in need of food, clothes, toys, guidance and educational opportunities.

Education

Junior Achievement

Junior Achievement (JA) ensures that every child in Wisconsin has an opportunity to obtain an understanding of our free enterprise system. Student participants in the Urban Implementation Program, gain the skills, knowledge, and motivation needed to succeed in our free enterprise system and in life. With a menu of volunteer-based programs, available grades include kindergarten through 12. Young people involved in JA learn by doing. JA's purpose is to inspire and prepare young people to succeed in a global economy.

Literacy Services of Wisconsin

The decision to obtain a GED can be one of the most important and life-changing decision an individual can make — it can open the door for new career opportunities, greater pay and even further education. The purpose of the GED Growth Initiative is to increase the number of GED graduates and to better assist individuals prepared to take the GED examination. Literacy Services of Wisconsin has been a nonprofit leader in delivering literacy programs to adults who reside in the Greater Milwaukee area. Many students are disadvantaged and have significant challenges to overcome. Additionally, some have little or negative academic experiences or a learning disorder that has resulted in less than successful educational results. To support these students, they have implemented methods to recognize particular learning challenges and new instructional methods have been introduced to respond to these issues. Students and tutors are energized by the new success they are experiencing with these methods.

Environmental



Riveredge Nature Center

Riveredge Nature Center, Inc., founded in 1968, is located in Ozaukee County, Wis. Riveredge was one of the first, and today is one of the largest, nature centers in Wisconsin, with a solid reputation for providing innovative, science-based environmental education. Riveredge's primary goal is to increase environmental literacy. Now in its 40th year, they continue to provide high-quality, science-based environmental education programs for schools, improve and expand adult education and family programming, protect and steward their 370-acre natural sanctuary and serve as a resource for scientific research.

Milwaukee Urban Garden, Inc.

The World Lunchbox (WL), from the Milwaukee Urban Garden, Inc., is an inter-generational curriculum which explores food growth and food preparation with youth of diverse backgrounds. WL will connect youth from different communities throughout Milwaukee to the earth, their ancestral and cultural food heritage, and each other. The curriculum will focus on the stories and profiles of farmers and community gardeners that grow food in Milwaukee, throughout Wisconsin and abroad. While most youth garden curricula address the biological science behind cultivating food, WL seeks to unearth the social science and anthropological history behind crop migration, food production and food preparation.

Veterans

Veterans for Peace

Veterans For Peace became a national 501(c)3 veterans organization in 1986. Members are mostly combat veterans of the Vietnam War, but many are also Korean War, Gulf War, and Iraq and Afghanistan War veterans. Milwaukee Veterans For Peace Chapter 102 started a Homeless Veterans Initiative in an effort to help end homelessness among the veteran population in Milwaukee. They have learned what these veterans need and have been able to help over 100 veterans find shelter, medical attention, food, clothing and jobs. They have purchased a van to deliver food throughout the city three times a week, and have recently begun working in partnership with a property owner to provide low-rent housing for homeless veterans.

Friends of Wisconsin Public TV

Wisconsin Vietnam War Stories and LZ Lambeau™ is inspired by Wisconsin's Native American Tribes who have never forgotten the importance of honoring our warriors. That long and valued tradition of honoring the service and sacrifice of their veterans is a model for everyone, and will be showcased at LZ Lambeau with a ceremonial opening to the event organized Wisconsin Native American Vietnam Veterans. The project includes extensive involvement of Wisconsin's Tribal Veterans Service Officers and Nate Nez, Wisconsin Department of Veterans Affairs liaison to Wisconsin tribes. Nez has organized a committee of Wisconsin Native American Vietnam veterans from across Wisconsin to participate in the planning, initial listening sessions and ongoing development of LZ Lambeau™. Vietnam veterans from the Ho-Chunk, Oneida, Potawatomi, Stockbridge-Munsee Mohican and the Menominee Nation are actively engaged in this project.




